2023 Fairfield Veterans Day Parade

On Saturday November 11, the City of Fairfield, through the Parks and Recreation Department, held its annual Veterans Day Parade. One great thing about living in close proximity to Travis Air Force Base is the way Fairfield and the surrounding cities in Solano County show respect, support and admiration to our entire military community and especially our Veterans. This annual parade is just one way that this is accomplished. While Fairfield is known for its 10am ceremony and lunch-time parade, Vacaville, Dixon and Suisun also hold Veterans Day events and ceremonies. This year's parade theme was "SALUTING AMERICA'S VETERANS"

I feel the parade themes over these last several years have been very meaningful and appropriate. Prior parade themes have been: 2022: "SERVING WITH HONOR"; 2021: "FRONT LINE PATRIOTS"; 2019: "CELEBRATING 100 YEARS OF AMERICAN LEGION"; 2018: "CELEBRATING TRAVIS AIR FORCE BASE 75TH ANNIVERSARY"; 2017: "WITH RESPECT, HONOR and GRATITUDE"; 2016: "PRAY. THANK. REMEMBER" and from 2015: "LAND OF THE FREE, BECAUSE OF THE BRAVE". I particularly like this last one. But they are all good stuff to pause and reflect on... Please go back and read them again.

While I personally never served in the armed forces, my late dad was a transport pilot for the Air Force for 21 years, flying the C-124 (Ol' Shakey!) for ten years, the brand new (at the time!) C-141 for six years, and finally the brand new (again, at the time) C-5 for his last three years 1970 - 1972. He also spent six months flying the F-100 Super Sabre at Cannon AFB New Mexico, in preparation for his tour in Vietnam in 1967-68, and then retired

from Travis as a Lt. Col. when I was just a little guy. And now my son Taylor is a fourth year Air Force pilot flying the B-52 at Barksdale AFB in Louisiana, following in his grandfather's footsteps. So the personal connection to the Air Force is strong, and I'm pleased that our club, through the efforts of Bill Davis and many others, does so much for our Veterans, both locally and at the Veterans Home in Yountville.

We started the day at our usual Solano Mall/Starbucks parking lot meeting place at the requested arrival time of 10:15am and had plenty of time to visit with each other and blow our last paycheck in Starbucks! And what would a Veterans Day Parade be without seeing Terry Burke looking sharp in his Air Force dress blues?

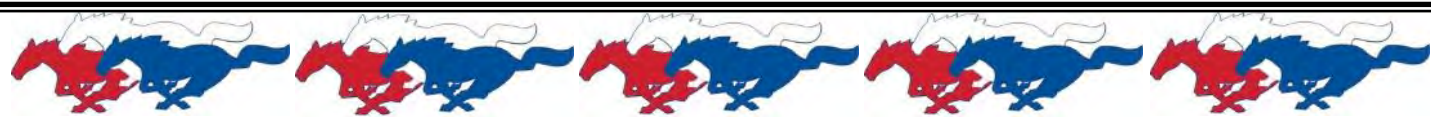

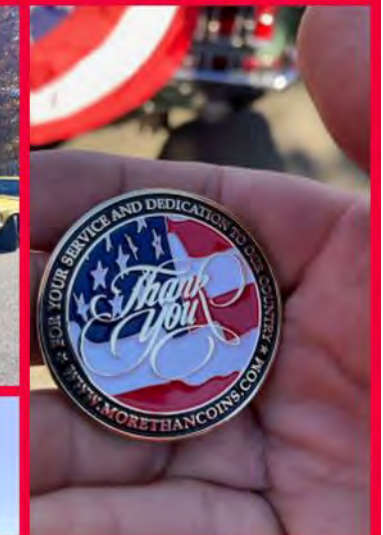

2023 Fairfield Veterans Day Parade

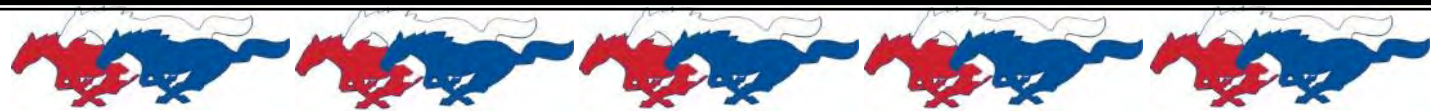


CHiPs For Kids Toy Drive

Tech Talk 2.0

Happy Holidays everyone. Merry Christmas and Happy Hannukah to all.

Well, here is the end of another year. The shows, parades, and cruises are pretty much done until the spring. Alice and I have had a great time with all of you and look forward to next year. We have learned a bunch this past year. Most importantly that there is a really outstanding bunch of people that make this club what it is. We are very proud to be part of the Golden Hills Mustang Club and consider all of you valued friends. Enjoy the Holidays and be safe so we all can have more fun next year.

I know that you all have your routines for cocooning your machine and I only have a few suggestions to offer.

If you can set them on jackstands or on rubber tire saver blocks that form a larger contact patch to help reduce the forming of flat spots on the tires by being parked for long periods. And, as a bonus, they prevent the vehicle from rolling. Doing this will reduce or eliminate having flat spotted tires. By using jack stands or curved parking blocks you won't have to set the e-brake while your car is parked and it will reduce the chance of having to deal with a frozen e-brake in the spring. Back in the day we would make the sound of an old cash register, Cha Ching! Then you will not have that very annoying bump, bump, bump, and vibration until they get some heat in them during that first drive. With some high-performance tires it can even cause permanent damage correctable only by replacement. Cha-Ching!

I recommend changing the oil before storage. Even if you have only put 500 miles on it this season there are contaminants and moisture that has built up in the oil (especially if your drives have been off the trailer, into the venue, or down the parade route, and back on the trailer). This combination of water and contaminants will develop acids in the oil that will corrode internal parts. More Cha-Ching! Doing this now is one less thing that you will have to do in the spring.

That's my two for you. It is clean and the cover is on just make sure that no one stacks Christmas boxes and all of those Amazon orders for Aunt Betty and Uncle Jack and all the rest of the Family on it.

For those of us who have modified our cars for more power and improved handling, who might still drive them

through winter months there are some considerations. Starting with those high-performance summer tires in below 40 temps. Most manufacturers don't recommend driving on them in those conditions and I can testify that it is no fun. They will not stick like they do on a 75-degree day and that can lead to plenty of excitement while pressing the fun pedal. Personally, now that I don't have to, if the temps are low or it is raining, I take my pickup. It is not worth the gamble and it would cut into my "fun-parts" money repairing boo boo's. I am going to spend my winter installing an oil to air engine oil cooler and ducting my radiator. Hoping to also add hood louvers. Cha-Ching! Cha-Ching! Cha-Ching! All of these things will increase cooling efficiency as I hope to put the car on the track for the first time in the spring since I will be out of warranty. Woo-Who!

It is a very good time to install a new set of water whackers (windshield wipers). The ones on the car are old, worn out, and hardened by the sun. For good visibility during the winter months, it is a wise investment. If you can't see it, you won't know what it is until you get out to share your insurance company info with the other driver. Also, buy a gallon or two of windshield washer fluid to go with those whackers and keep your windshield washer tank full to remove road grime and oil for good visibility (see previous sentence). Also, clean the inside of your windows. Those high dollar stogies you have been smoking and that time that you forgot to roll down the window while chewing Redman will cause you to see things on the road that are not there. Cleaning the inside helps reduce glare and just makes driving safer if you have to be out and about, but especially when it is raining.

Check your tire tread depth and pressures. If the tread depth is equal to or won't touch Mr. Lincoln's head when you put a penny into the groove, baby needs new shoes. Cha-Ching! Check your tire pressures. Under-inflated tires hydroplane sooner than a properly inflated tire and are very dangerous. Hydroplaning is when the tire loses contact with the pavement due to water not being pumped out from the contact patch by the tread. Yes, all of that fancy tread patterning is there to "pump" water out of the contact patch, among other things. If you can't or don't know how to do this, swing by your favorite tire shop and see Nick or

Tom and they will do it for you at no charge. Oh, and that light that has been on in the dash? Mention that to them at the shop. If it is not something they normally handle they might be able to direct you to a proper facility that can do the necessary repair. Especially on the newer cars there is no shortage of warning lights. Be especially aware of the ones that indicate brake problems. It won't do you a bit of good that your tires are in great condition and you can see like on a clear day if you can't stop because your brakes don't work properly. Every light means something and it is a good idea to know what they mean and take care of the problem as soon it comes on.

Speaking of lights, do all of the lights on your car work? Headlights (high and low beams), turn signals, emergency flashers, brake lights are they all working properly? Replacement of inoperative units can range from simple bulb replacement to wiring problems or having to change out modules. This can range from about \$0.75 for a tail light bulb to \$1,500.00 or even more for cars with those "That dude is driving with his high beams on!" headlights. He is not, but damn some of those new car headlights are bright! The new Mustangs with HID or LED headlights can be very expensive. Make sure that all of your exterior lighting works. In addition, make sure that your interior lights work also. And finally, if you are driving a classic or older car that does not have Bluetooth, please do not to use your phone while you are driving. If you must make or take a call or message stop in a safe, well-lit place. Newer cars are

almost always equipped with Bluetooth but managing incoming and outgoing messages, creates a distraction from driving. According to NHTSA distracted driving accounted for 3522 deaths in 2021. Don't become a statistic. We want everyone to be with us for as long as possible. And if you are anything like me, you already have a full dance card of dumb things that you've done.

It has been a lot of fun penning these articles this year and I look forward to doing it next year. You all have been entertaining and I hope that I have been able to entertain a bit as well as help you with something on your car. Now, if I could just get all of you to take me for a rip in your ride(s) (and a few of you already have, Thank You) and get Dan to install a Posi-Traction rear end in the roadster, because two tire fire is way cooler than one wheel peel, my Christmas would be complete.

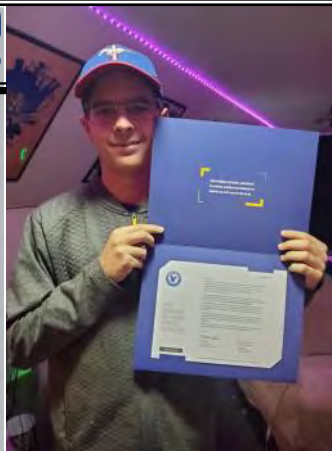


CONGRATULATIONS

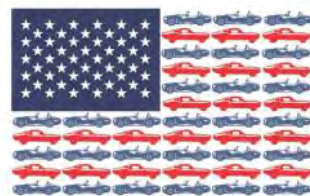
