

On Saturday, October 5, 2024, Terry & Ileine Burke and Kathy Loya joined Paul & I at the Freedom Equine Connection Demonstration in the Dixon countryside. There was a pretty good turn-out of various aged people; from young school aged children and teens with their parents, to people in our club's age group, as well as some older folks.



When we arrived, there were 3 beautiful horses with free range inside the arena; they were separated from us by a barrier fence. Lena, the Palamino, came up to the fence to meet us up close and personal. The other 2 were in the center of the arena interacting with each other. Barista, the Hanoverian Warmblood, was checking out what was going on the outside of the arena. Pepsi, a Quarter Horse, was being a little mischievous by knocking over a plastic barrel.

Denise explained how the horses are prey animals and have an acute sense of their surroundings. Also, the heartbeat of a horse is slower than a human, and when the person is near the horse, their hearts will begin to sync. Horses can pick up your emotions and respond accordingly. The horse reads your body language and energy; the assisting staff member will offer a possible explanation as to why the horse is reacting the way it did, and they will ask you some questions to help you recognize what the reason might be.



A little background information: Jim Wilson is the Founder Clinical Pastoral Counseling, specializing in trauma, and the Chaplain for the Vacaville Police Department and is a Fire Chaplain.

Jim told a story of a young student having difficulty with solving a problem. He told this student it's ok if you can't solve the problem, give the problem to the horse. He explained that doing this transfers the frustration of not being able to solve the problem and be able to think about it without any added pressure. explained you may have an issue that you intended to work on when you walk in to the therapy session, or you may have nothing on your mind; or perhaps there may be something that will trigger us about the horses, and what to expect. They also explained a thoughts or feelings during the therapy session. It's all a learning

One exercise has the participant lead the horse through a PVC A little background information: Denise Wilson is the Presi- pipe "alley way" lined with several buckets, which represented bothering them on a slip of paper, then drop them separately into each bucket. While leading the horses, the task was to keep the horse from being distracted by the carrots (temptation) in the buckets. Jim explained that distractions or temptations are what might be keeping you from focusing on solving an issue or problem; whether it is work, home, or school related. In other words, by controlling the horse, you are gaining confidence in yourself, and that the same technique can be used in your own situation; to be in control of your emotions, and don't let distractions or temptations pull you away.

The other exercise is intended for younger students to lead the horse along one side of cones lined-up that have various words attached, read the word on each cone out loud; then do the same returning back the up the other side. For instance, the word "cod" would be on one side, then on the return trip the same cone would have the word "code". Tech Tells 2.0 By Paul Troxell

The Premium Question (Part II)

As I mentioned last month, I still have a bit more to talk about regarding the Premium Fuel question. There is a lot going on inside your engine that the fuel that you purchase has an effect to a much greater degree than many of us are aware of on engine performance. My purpose in writing this is not to sway anyone's decision on which fuel to buy. If you own a car with a low compression engine, or any engine designed to run on Regular gasoline, I will be the first to tell you that putting Premium in the tank regularly is a waste of your money. It will not produce more power and most likely will not increase your gas mileage. But, should you ever experience poor idle, stuttering acceleration, or just poor performance overall, you may benefit from filling the tank with Premium from Chevron, Conoco Phillips, Shell, in no particular order of ranking, and see if the extra additives in the fuel resolve the issues that you are having. For the difference in the price of the Premium vs. whatever you normally buy you may just resolve the issue that you are having. This being because it was caused by a dirty fuel system. Especially today many gasoline engines use Direct Injection much the same a diesel engine and the injectors are very susceptible to dirt because of the extremely small nozzle ports and the environment that they live in. Port injectors, on the other hand, can be larger and are in the intake just before the intake valve and are less prone to the same problem. But they do not escape the fuel quality problem; neither do carburetors.

OK, enough on that. Now onto what is going on when that fuel enters the cylinder. Here is the most violent place in your entire engine. Let's start with the fact that 70% of all of the heat that the engine produces is created by the piston and rings sliding up and down in that cylinder. How fast? The 5.0 Coyote at 7000RPM is moving the piston and rings 70.965 feet per second. To add a bit of perspective to that, the stroke on a Coyote 5.0 is 92.7mm or 3.64 inches. While travelling that 70.965 feet per second, the piston changes direction just shy of 234 times. Normally the piston and the rings never actually touch the cylinder wall, as they are prevented doing so by a very thin layer of engine oil if everything is working properly. Also keep in mind that depending on the load and throttle setting, the temperature inside the cylinder of the burning gasoline can exceed 1700 degrees Fahrenheit. Now, hold that thought.

Most of us have our favorite brand of motor oil, been using it since I learned to drive. It's the best! Right? Well, I have covered that a bit in previous articles. I generally say that it's just like your favorite whiskey. Most of us don't know how its made and we drink it because it tastes good to us. Motor oil is usually bought because marketing and advertising have created some kind of benefit that we think is really important. It will make our machines last forever, get great gas mileage, and never leave us on the side of the road due to engine breakdown. And, thankfully, most of the time that is what we get.

But now I am going to get small, have you ever thought about where that oil lives (and dies)? Yea, yea, it's in the crankcase where all of the oil is, right? However, lets consider what happens when the oil is on the cylinder wall, the piston rings, and in the piston grooves. We are now in an alternate universe.

First, there isn't much oil in this alternate universe. The oil film here is between 0.2 and 8 microns thick. To give this some perspective a typical bacterium is between 1-8 microns. Human hair ranges from 20-200 microns. Now, let's consider the temperature in this universe. Gasoline combustion temperatures are in the range of 2200F to 2500F. And, not all of it gets burned. There will be unburnt fuel as soon as it enters the cylinder as some of it condenses on the cylinder wall. This occurs because the cylinder wall absorbs some of the heat that has caused the fuel to vaporize and it will return to a liquid state. There will also be some that simply does not burn completely after it has been ignited and during the power stroke. Tons of science going on here, but I will move on. This creates fuel dilution in the oil. As we all know gasoline is not a good lubricant for large metal parts. So, not only is the oil trying to protect parts that are very hot, it is also being diluted with a solvent that severely reduces its ability to do so. It is common for drain oil to have fuel present in it in the crankcase at levels of 1-5 percent which is affected by many variables like how accurately tuned the fuel system is (carburetor(s), port fuel injection, direct injection, etc.), idle time, load, and on and on. Lots of science here, too. However, at the piston ring and groove the fuel dilution rate can be 10-20% or even more! Oh! I forgot to mention that not only is the piston ring the highest heat producing part of the engine, it also has the distinction of being the highest wearing part of the engine. So why have we not ever seen an advertisement for an engine oil that protects the most violent and stressful place in the engine? Hmm...

All of this to say that you can add the gasoline that you use to protecting the rings, ring gap and cylinder walls of your engine. Some brands (Shell specifically) claim that they can reduce cylinder wall and ring wear. They accomplish this by using friction modifiers in the fuel. This reduces friction between the ring and cylinder wall. It follows that if friction is reduced them wear is also. SO, while the additives in the oil that prevent oxidation are consumed during operation Shell gasoline is constantly replenishing the oxidation and wear additives that are being consumed in the oil.

In closing this month, the motor oil that you put in your car is not the only thing that protects the engine from wear; so does the fuel that you use. The fuel also keeps in the system clean from the tank to the combustion chambers and even out the exhaust pipe. If you have an athlete for a car, new or classic, make sure that it performs like one by feeding and caring for it properly. In the long run it will save you money and keep it running strong for many, many years.
