



On Saturday May 17th GHMC put on the 40th Annual Biggest Little Car Show. This year's Car Show Organizers were on site and getting busy at 6AM. The weather was cool in the morning and warmed up to the mid 70's during the day with the usual moderate breeze that the Suisun Waterfront always experiences. Overall, we had an exceptional day weather wise which only added to the festive atmosphere.

Cars began lining up for registration before the 7am start time. They began to fill the parking lot and swell out into the street, but with a little encouragement from the registration crew, they were able to get everyone to pull in tighter and keep cars off of Main Street. 

Well, the spring season has come upon us. There are more events to choose from and go to and we are all busy catching up on yard work, home repairs, and other important matters. It is also that time of the year that some of us are waking our Ponies and getting them ready for some rides. I covered a lot of this last year, but I want to just touch on a few things to remind you all to look at. These apply even to those of us who daily drive our Mustangs, and all other cars and trucks.

So, here is a list of items, in no particular order since they are all important items.

- 1.) Check the tires. For wear, damage (I know, it has not been driven all winter. But, did you check them last fall?), and correct inflation.
- 2.) While you are on your knees take look under the car for any fluid leaks. Also look at the undercarriage for any wet spots from leaks (coolant, oil, trans fluid, brake fluid, power steering fluid and gasoline).
- 3.) Check the battery water level (remember it is acid and water). If it is low, charge the battery before adding water unless the water is below the plates. Then, only add enough water to cover the plates before charging.
- 4.) Inspect under the hood for any signs of weeps, leaks, and critters who have taken up residence and the damage that they will do when they have. Them little beggars can chew up insulation, wiring, and things that you would not even believe that they could be interested in. Repair as necessary.
- 5.) Then check all of your fluid levels. Engine, brakes, cooling system, power steering, and windshield washer tank or bag. While you are doing this ask yourself when was the last time that I changed the fluids in these systems. There are all kinds of recommendations on engine oil change intervals. The manufacturer recommendation is the first that most go by. The second is the old "every 3000 miles" taught to us by the oil change stores. Which one is right for you? In my 17 years of selling lubricants there was only one answer that I would give to anyone who asked that question. It depends. And the only way to know with any kind of certainty is by using oil analysis. Yes. It costs more money, but if you are trying to extract the maximum life out of your oil, and the lowest cost of operation it is the ONLY way to know when to change your oil. Oh, you have an oil life monitor in your car? Well, that is a little program that operates on an algorithm that calculates oil life by a preselected set of parameters like engine run time after each start, operating temperature, load, rpm, etc. It is good, but not as accurate as oil analysis. So even if your car sat in the garage all winter your Oil Life Monitor will go down. Why? Because oil oxidizes even when the engine never gets started. This means that the additive package and the base oil is degrading even while you are not using the car. The Mustang with an OLM will usually drop .5%/day even

while the engine is not started. And your oil life will drop faster when driven short distances. So, do you want to change the oil?

- 6.) Brake fluid will degrade over time as well. Mostly it picks up water since it is hygroscopic. This means that it has an affinity for water and picks it up from the atmosphere. Brake fluid boils at much higher temperatures than water. Depending on the specific brand and type it could have a boiling point as high as 600 degrees. Water boils at 212 degrees at sea level and lower at altitude. This would not work well for a brake fluid. When was the last time that you flushed your brake fluid? Planning any mountain drives?
- 7.) Well, by now you are catching my drift. The same applies to coolant, power steering fluid and transmission fluid. If you haven't changed them in the last two, three, or twenty years, you are setting yourself up to have a roadside stay. Take a serious moment to consider servicing these systems to keep them operating efficiently and reliably. The cost of the fluids and the time to perform the service, or even paying to have the service done, can be far less expensive than having a road incident.

One last comment on the oil change interval. Many newer cars have oil change intervals of 10,000 miles, and some higher. Consider who sets this interval. The manufacturer wants their customers to think that their car is inexpensive to operate and maintain. In reality a car that is driven infrequently, short distances, and/or doesn't get to operating temperatures is in the same severe service category as a taxi cab in New York City that idles for prolonged periods and drives short distances. Sounds crazy, I know, but it is the truth. In comparison to parts and repair, lubricants and fluids are cheap.

My recommendation is, consider what kind of driving you do. Also consider the cost of repairing and/or replacing the components that could be damaged by service fluids that no longer provide the protection they are designed to. It is somewhat easier for those with OLM's and much more difficult for those with older cars that do not have these systems. Unless you are doing oil analysis at each oil change.
