The 24 Hours of Le Mans

Bonjour les amis!

In the French countryside a 3-hour drive from Paris, there is a large motorsports complex known as the "Circuit de la Sarthe". It is the home of the racing pinnacle that we know as Le Mans. I was lucky enough to join friends and 325,000 other spectators to see the 'Centenary' or 100th anniversary of the race this year. The 91st actual event as there was no race in 1936 due to labor strikes, and no races from 1940-1948 due to World War 2.

In and around the city of Le Mans, the circuit is an 8.5-mile-long course comprised of a private track and public roads. One of the public roads is the Mulsanne Straight, a famous - as well as infamous - straightaway 3.7 miles in length. Imagine a race at Sonoma Sears

Point that dumps out the back gate onto Lakeville highway, turns right at Ernie's Tin Bar, makes another right turn onto 121, and then back into the main gate of Sears Point. When there is no race, the Mulsanne is just a road, albeit with guardrails, berms, or alligator strips, and a sea of rubber marbles! There are homes and businesses on Mulsanne, so imagine trying to sleep as cars are driving by your house at 200+ mph at 3 AM!

The circuit has changed in design and length for improvements to both driver and spectator safety as the French work to avoid a disaster like the one in 1955. The new Hyper cars accomplish the 8.5-mile lap in about 3 minutes 26 seconds, averaging about 155 mph a lap. Additional curves were on the Mulsanne help to

slow down speeds. Known as the Daytona and Indianapolis chicanes, they are a French embrace to American races, which our tracks have in turn named their own curves for Le Mans. It was fascinating to take pictures of the cars from a platform at these curves on Sunday, then drive by the platforms on the Mulsanne on Monday!

The pomp and circumstance of the start included flyovers from jets with colored smoke and a perhaps a -130. A French flag roped down from a helicopter by a soldier who handed it to LeBron James - the Race Marshal this year - who waved it at exactly 4 PM to start the race. Tom Brady made an appearance, Patrick Dempsey was with his team in the garage, Roger Penske and Rick Hendrick were in their team boxes above the garages. I was happy to see and meet one of the drivers from the Iron Dames team, an all-female group. And I cannot forget the two random dinosaurs supporting the REXY Livery green Porsche. (It had teeth). Spoiler Alert! - Ferrari won this year, which they have not done in 58 years, because we all know what happened 57 years ago! (To the inquiring minds, I did not wear my Shelby Team shirt lest I get beat up by Italian guys behind a tire rack in the pits).

So, what was it like? The noise, the speeds, the people! There were three different classes running at the same time. The Hyper Cars are the fastest, they are extreme, loud, and amazing. Cadillac (yes, that car brand) had three of them in the race, with one crashing early. Not your Grandad's Cadillac but a violently fast automotive beast that looks nothing like the street cars you know. Most cars ran a V8, and the American cars were very 'throaty.' I could tell when a Cadillac, Corvette, or the Camaro were coming into a turn without seeing the car. Porsche, Ferrari, and Oreca represented, as was Toyota. When the clock hit 4 PM on Sunday, Ferrari had won by completing 342 laps in 24 hours. The highest placing American (ninth place) was in a Porsche 963 hyper car. Jimmie Johnson's ZL1 Camaro (Le Monstre - The Monster), was in a unique 'Innovation' class - also known at Garage 56 - in which he got to race, but not place, but he was 39th overall, completing 285 laps. Changes are coming for the classes in 2024, which allows 'Le Monstre' to return, and prior to the race Ford announced they will have their new Mustang GT3 racecar there in 2024. I am waiting for the phone call to drive it, but for now I need to catch up on my sleep.

Tech Talk 2.0

🔥 Can You Handle the Heat? 🔥

Happy Independence Day everyone! I hope that your weekend celebrations were happy and joyous. You probably noticed that it was also very hot. Or, maybe not. Maybe you were in the pool or running through the sprinklers with the kids? Yeah, it was that hot at my place this past weekend.

Heat is the topic this month. Specifically, the heat that causes our ponies to pull over hang on the hitchin' post. I thought that I would make some maintenance recommendations and offer some tips on how to help keep them at a steady gallop. Regardless of year model there must be coolant (still often referred to as anti-freeze) in the cooling system for it to do its job. To check the coolant level, **NEVER CHECK THE COOLANT WHEN THE ENGINE IS HOT.** Always do this when the engine is cold to avoid being severely burned. Undoing the radiator or degassing tank cap on a hot engine will cause severe burns. When the engine is cold it is best to simply look at or in the degassing tank (radiator overflow tank) and see if the level is at the cold fill mark. If so, and you are not having overheating issues you are good to go. If it is low, top off with 50/50 coolant premix or plain water (distilled is best). **NEVER** top off with 100% coolant. This will result in the coolant/water ratio being too high and reduce the cooling efficiency of the system.

Water is a better coolant than coolant. Yes, I said that correctly water cools better than coolant. Coolant is designed to lower the freeze point, protect the system from corrosion, and to lubricate the water pump bearing. The water does most of the cooling. If your car does not have a degassing tank then open the radiator cap and look into the radiator to see the level. Then use the same procedure as above and top the radiator up and reinstall the cap tightly. You should not be adding premixed coolant to your car on a regular basis. If you are, then you have a problem that needs attention.

While you are looking at the fluid in the cooling system take note of its condition. Coolant can be various colors, red, orange, pink, green, or yellow just to name a few. However, it should never be rusty brown, or milky in appearance. Any of the first colors that I listed is a good sign that the coolant is in good condition. Check your owner's manual for the recommended coolant and use it especially if the car is under warranty. The manual will also have recommended service intervals to change the coolant in the system. This is important, just as important as changing the oil in the engine. Proper coolant service will keep the cooling system free of sludge and corrosion that reduces its ability to cool and extend the life of not only the cooling system, but that of the engine, too. If you do not have experience doing this kind of service take it to the shop that you trust and have it done. It is far cheaper to properly service the system than it is to be on the side of the road. Tow bills, radiators hoses, thermostats, head gaskets, or even a complete engine rebuild can add up to thousands in no time.

If you are a do it yourselfer it is far better and less expensive to do the service yourself than it is to do all of the repairs that

could result from a system failure. I use a Motive Products system evacuator after draining the coolant to check and see if I have any leaks in the system first. If it sucks air in, it will leak coolant out. Then, once I have determined that I have no leaks and/or have repaired any that I found, I use the same tool to draw the new coolant (maximum of 50/50 premix) back into the engine and cooling system. Doing it this way reduces air pockets and the need to start the engine and run it to "burp" the air out. Burping works, but one can also end up with hot spots where the air pockets are and damage can occur. Once you have completed the service make sure to put all of the waste product into sealed containers and drop off at the recycle center. It is toxic and will cause severe liver damage and even kill if it is ingested. **SO DO NOT LEAVE COOLANT ANYWHERE WHERE CHILDREN OR PETS CAN GET TO IT.** All modern coolant has a bitterant in it to deter animals from ingesting it. But dispose of it promptly and properly and forget about the liability.

It is also a very good idea to inspect the entire front of the vehicle for anything that is or could obstruct airflow to the radiator. Plastic bags, hamburger wrappers, leaves, parts of the mattress that fell off of that pickup that you were following to close. Anything that blocks the airflow can cause an overheat condition. Also, look at the condition of the outside of the radiator. Is it clean? A stiff bristled plastic brush can be used to gently brush debris and bugs from the fins. Are the fins bent over from road debris impacting them? There are tools called fin combs that you can buy to help stand the bent fins back up for those of us who are anal enough about these things (I use a layout scribe and do them one at a time). You might even notice coolant leaks while doing an exterior radiator inspection.

And finally, do yourself a service each and every time that you drive your car. When you are walking up to it, or have just backed out of the garage, look at where your pony was parked. If there are ANY wet spots, STOP, get out and determine what it is. All leaks are indications of a problem (well, except that puddle that comes off of the a/c system, that is just water from the frost that forms on it and is normal). Coolant leaks indicate that your pony is about to lighten your wallet or purse by many Benjamins if you decide to drive it. I don't care what you pay for the service and fluids they are much cheaper than the systems that they protect. I have a 22-year-old pickup that still has the original radiator along with 2 other vehicles and have never had a cooling issue with them because I follow the recommended cooling system service schedule.


