




Is Your Driving Slipping?

Hello everyone, and Happy New Year! It is raining out today and it is supposed to rain all weekend. I hope that all of you will be careful while you are out in your cars and leave that extra space between you and the car ahead. I am sure that everyone has experienced putting on the brakes and having the tires slide on the wet pavement or having the anti-lock system activate and feel the brake pedal chattering under foot keeping the wheels from locking up. No matter when or where it happens it is not a welcome experience. But that is not what I am going to talk about this month.

My dissertation this month does have a lot to do with the contact patch, that portion of the tire that is actually making contact with the roadway, and what happens when we turn the steering wheel. That small patch of rubber and the asphalt or concrete that it touches is where all of the magic happens. This is where the car accelerates, stops, and corners. Some do it much better than others depending on how the car and suspension are designed, what kind of tires and their size are, and whether the car is an econobox, Luxo Boat, street/sports car, or race car. But they all slip even when the brakes aren't applied when the car is making even the smallest turn. This is where we find slip angle. Now, without getting into some high-level mathematics, slip angle can be simply defined as a measurement of the distance in degrees of angle between where your tires are pointed and where the car is going. Referring to this image may help to understand what I am about to describe.



Since the tire is made of rubber it has a significant amount of flexibility and goes through many kinds of deformations while it is rolling across the road surface the contact patch changes size and shape. This is caused by the uneven road surface, the sidewall flexing and absorbing some of the shock from the uneven road, and as you can see in the diagram, when the steering wheel is turned. The contact patch in relation to the rest of the tire becomes twisted and does not travel the same direction as the rest of the tire. All of these deformations cause the tire to heat up. Even the tires construction, which is determined by what the tire is designed for, changes how it reacts to all of the forces mentioned and there are more forces that I have not mentioned. A purpose-built race car tire would be nearly useless for a street car and the reverse is true as well. Race tires have much softer tread compounds that are "slick" for dry weather racing so that

there is maximum contact with the roadway for maximum traction. This means that they have none of the grooving and sipes like a DOT approved tire for a passenger car or truck. Those who set up race cars are very familiar with slip angle and its effects on how the car will turn in, rotate, and accelerate out of a corner.

But enough about race cars. When we turn the steering wheel on our Mustangs the same thing happens. The tire, being very flexible and not made of steel (which would also flex), turns in the direction that we want to go. When this happens the weight of the car is transferred to the outside wheels (the right-hand side wheels in a left-hand turn) which increases the weight on them. It also increases the grip the tires have on the roadway. This side force is the centrifugal force created by the car turning around a point and is called lateral force. Try to visualize a car making a left turn on a sweeping country road. Pick any point any distance from the left side of the car. Now draw a line from that point to each of the four wheels of the car making sure that the lines are perpendicular to each wheel and intersect at the point that you have selected. What you will discover is that each wheel on the car has a different slip angle. In other words, each wheel is traveling a different direction to the actual direction that the car is traveling. Another interesting fact is that each wheel is traveling at a different speed because each of them is following a different arc from that point that we picked. Without getting into the trigonometry involved here, because I dropped out of Trig in my first year of college, let's get back to slip angle.

Using the diagram, you can see what I just described. Where the tires are pointed and where the car is going is two different trajectories. The difference between the two is slip angle. The engineers that design our cars can change the way that a car feels and handles by changing many things in the body of the car, the suspension system, and even the tires that come with the car to affect how it handles. An extreme example of how the driver experiences this would be to compare a 1965 Mustang to a 2025 Mustang. They are two entirely different cars when comparing the driving experience. The engineers calculate the slip angle into their design of the suspension system and the tires that are chosen for the car to achieve the goal they are after. Those who set up race cars use this knowledge of their car and tires to achieve the best set up for the track that they are on. So now, you have received the 30,000' view intro to slip angle.

Next month I will introduce you to Ackermann Angle. That is for all of you over achievers out there so you can dig in early to get ahead of the class.
